

Terms of Payment

The Berlage Post-Master of Science in Architecture and Urban Design

Tuition fee

The tuition fee for the program is set at €18.000 per academic year. Thus €27,000 for the entire 18-month program. The tuition fee is to be paid in full **before July 1**. The payment of the tuition fee forms a part of the admission procedure. Only students that have made their payment in time can be admitted to the program. The payment has been made in time, when the full payment of the tuition fee and if applicable the Guarantee Amount, are received on our bank account before July 1. Please, be aware that when you apply just before the deadline of June 1, the tuition fee must still be paid before July 1. The Berlage also accepts confirmation letters of scholarship programs as payment, even though the payment has not been made yet.

Down payment

To confirm your admission, we ask you to make a non-refundable down payment of €750. This down payment is to be received within 3 weeks after you receive our financial letter. Please note that the down payment only secures your place in our program and does not start the visa and housing application process.

Living costs

Non-EU/EFTA students will need to pay a living costs amount together with their tuition fee. This is to prove to the Dutch Immigration Service (IND) that you are able to support yourself financially for at least a full year. After arrival in The Netherlands, the Living Costs will be deposited to your Dutch bank account after deduction of the costs for visa and accommodation services (if applicable). The living costs for the academic year is €12,250.

Additional study costs

There will be extra individual costs for printing, presentation materials and a contribution for the fieldwork trips. The estimated costs for the 3 semesters are about €3,500.

Please note that payment of the tuition fee (payment deadline is July 1) is part of your enrollment to our program. Currently there is a shortage on affordable student accommodations. TU Delft's housing services use your enrollment date as placement on their waiting list for housing. The sooner you are enrolled the higher you are on the waiting list.
